## **Two Months in Norway**

Report of an IAESTE internship – June and July 2023 Ricarda Tomasi, biology, ETHZ

## Work

I was part of the Between The Fjords Lab lead by Vigdis Vandvik at the University of Bergen (UIB) for two months as an intern in field ecology. I helped wherever they needed me and mostly did fieldwork for their new DURIN project. It is a project about the underappreciated role of dwarf-shrubs in responding to and influencing global climate change. Therefore, I spend most of my summer outdoors looking at heather and different kind of berries helping with phenology work, plant functional trait studies and carbon flux measurements. It was quite a different type of work compared to studying cellular and molecular biology at ETHZ (which involves a lot of pipetting) and I was able to gain many new experiences.

I also had the opportunity to join a three-week long work-trip to northern Norway during my stay, which was very interesting, and quite the unusual work experience. I worked, travelled and lived together with my colleagues for almost a month changing location each week. We travelled by boat, car, plane and bus. We slept in big houses, small camping cabins, student dorms, hotels and sometimes shared rooms. We worked in sun, heat, rain, wind and surrounded by millions of mosquitos. We played games, cooked, discussed life, academics, and cultural differences together. We celebrated accomplishments of each other, we argued with each other and got over it, we formed friendships. Overall, it was quite an intense time but I would not miss it. Highlights of my trip were definitely taking a swim in the sea above the Arctic Circle, watching the midnight sun and hiking some amazing places.
